












English


The English faculty is wholly committed to supporting the transition from primary school to secondary education. Stimulating texts, prose and poetry facilitate and engage our students at Key Stage 3, simultaneously preparing them for the skills necessary for KS4. Encouraging independent reading skills alongside grammar and literacy competency, help foster autonomous learning and proficiency. As a result, students are extremely well prepared for the demands of Year 10 & 11.

All students study a combined course of English language and Literature, which enables them to achieve two GCSE's in this subject.

The English faculty provide opportunities for the appreciation of texts through 'World Book Day' and 'Poetry day.' These are celebratory events which include exciting activities and competitions such as dressing as a 'book character.'
Undoubtedly, this has proved extremely popular with students and staff alike!
Additionally, students are encouraged to debate their oratory skills through 'Youth speaks' in which Penair students achieve highly in competitions.

Moreover, Media studies is a popular choice with students who want to foster media skills, which will help nurture their understanding of magazines, newspapers, the music industry and the digital age!

Science

Balanced science is taught throughout the school. This means that all students use biology, chemistry and physics contexts in order to develop skills.

At Key Stage 3 students are enthused by themes which place them in a scientific role that requires particular skills to be learned and developed. Progress is assessed throughout the course using a wide range of activities and practicals, measured against national guidelines.

All students are required to study science at Key Stage 4 and have two options. A number of students achieve two GCSE grades. A grade for core science, and one for additional science, both of which include biology, chemistry and physics. A number of students following the Eagle route at the end of Key Stage 3 assessments, choose to study a greater breadth and opt for separate sciences (biology, chemistry and physics) achieving 3 GCSE grades.

In addition there are many extracurricular activities and events that take place within the faculty such as science club, science leaders and even physics busking. Pupils involved in these activities have delivered lessons and workshops in primary schools, to local Beaver groups as well as the BBC Radio Cornwall stand at the Royal Cornwall Show. Our dynamic science show team also present a series of registration demonstrations. During these sessions tutor groups are immersed in an exciting area of science through dramatic demonstrations.

Out of all our subjects, science has the highest number of pupils who choose to study a science AS level at Truro College.

The Art Department at Penair is a place where students are encouraged to explore ideas, materials and processes in a safe and supportive environment. Students are taught that even when they make "mistakes" in Art, through practice and perseverance, success can follow.

Art is taught in three large purpose-built studios. We are also lucky enough to have a large exhibition space, kiln room and print room.

At Key Stage 3, we aim to ground students' knowledge of some of the great artists and art movements, helping them harness a wide experience of practical skills. Drawing takes many forms and underpins almost everything we do throughout all year groups and projects.

We offer extra studio time at lunchtime and often after school for students to complete work. We regularly arrange trips to London galleries, local exhibitions, Falmouth University and we also arrange for students to work with professional contemporary artists. All students have the opportunity to exhibit work in the community in Year 8 as part of the Combined Truro Schools Project. There is also an Art Club for KS3 students once a week after school.

From the very beginning of Year 7, we train our students to work effectively and co-operatively in groups. They work towards original, imaginative performances, critically evaluating their own and others' work.


At every level, students explore text, improvisation and live theatre from the perspectives of actor, director and critic.

Our vision is to create Music, enable our students to love the subject and inspire them as musicians. Students can find an outlet for self-expression and can experience contributing to and being part of a wider community. We encourage students of all abilities to explore their talents across what is a very broad subject area and hope to foster an enjoyment of music that will last a lifetime.

Within mixed ability Key Stage 3 groups, students have two hours of music lessons per fortnight in mixed ability groups. Through studying topics such as The Ukulele (yr 7), Gamelan and Electronic Dance Music (yr8) and Rock Band Project (yr9), students develop their understanding of how music is created and the importance it plays in different times, places and cultures.

In furthering their development of personal musical interest, students have the option of studying GCSE Music, or BTEC Music in which they develop their performing and composing skills.

The music department currently consists of two well-resourced teaching rooms, 2 practice rooms and a larger rehearsal space.

Students have access to digital and traditional pianos, a range of high-spec Casio/Yamaha keyboards, three acoustic drum kits, two electric drum-kits, electric/bass guitars, acoustic guitars, Ukuleles, Brass Instruments and various tuned and un-tuned percussion instruments. Additionally, we have a computer room with music technology software in the department and students in all years can use software including Sibelius, Sonar, Dance EJ, Garage Band and Logic Pro.

The Design Technology Faculty believes in enabling all students to become independent, creative and innovative designers, moving design forward in a rapidly developing technological world.

We recognise the value of risk taking, and that experimentation and unexpected outcomes provide innovative opportunities for designing and constructing.

Key Stage 3 students study three modules in DT each year: Engineering, Food & Catering and Textiles. Modules are regularly updated to keep pace with with changing technologies.

At Key Stage 4 a range of materials are offered as popular options at GCSE. The faculty regularly reviews these and offers new courses to inspire and motivate students in our fast changing world.

Students are able to make use of a laser cutter, a 3-D printer, CNC router, well-equipped specialist rooms, and an up-to-date computer suite with "state of the art" design software. We work with many of our local primary schools to support the teaching of Design and Technology. Many Key Stage 1 and 2 children have been able to use our facilities in practical Food lessons and in Engineering this year. SPLAT day and Jamie Oliver's food revolution day went down a treat.



Humanities & SMSC


We want students to be inquisitive and to reflect on their learning: to understand the way we live and our own internal set of beliefs.

Students use Humanities lessons to discover British values and explore Social, Moral, Spiritual and Cultural understanding of themselves and their world. Through world wars and natural disasters, students learn how events and choices shape our future. Students are encouraged to reflect on the morality and ethics of decisions in a way that will help them in later life, and enable them to be Active Citizens in their communities.

All subjects are taught in a crosscurricular way, with all teachers involved in more than one subject area.

Magistrates, local leaders and other prolific members of the community, help offer expertise and reality to our events, such as 'Day of difference' and 'Prison me, no way' days. Our Erasmus and overseas trips enable the students to experience a context and reality to past events and present-day cultures.

Modern Foreign Languages

We firmly believe in the value of learning a foreign language and that every child should have the right to learn a language throughout his or her time with us.

We believe that languages are important for the world of work, travel and tourism but that learning a foreign language contributes to a sense of self- confidence, literacy skills and knowledge of the world. Learning a language fosters a sense of tolerance because of the necessity to see the world from somebody else's point of view.

The main languages we teach are French and German. When a pupil joins the school, he or she will be allocated a tutor group which studies either French or German. Students will continue with that language throughout Key Stage 3 and then choose to continue to GCSE in Key Stage 4. Students who show an aptitude for their first language will be able to do a second in Year 8.

One of our teachers is a French national and pupils are used to hearing teachers speaking French and German in a natural way in the department and in turn find that our enthusiasm for language is infectious.

Business & Computing


We are educating students today for industries that do not yet exist. As a faculty we endeavour to provide your child with the knowledge and understanding they require to be savvy, confident users in what is an increasingly digital world.

We place emphasis on 'doing' rather than 'writing' where ICT is concerned. They will have access to 'state of the art' facilities in a purpose built Business and Enterprise Centre, industry standard software and the opportunity to use a wide range of digital devices from GPS systems to Raspberry Pi's. We work collaboratively with other departments promoting a culture that encourages students to use transferable skills in their language, in any context.

Recognising the growing importance of fostering creators not consumers of technology, we ensure your child is given opportunities to understand the fundamentals of computer programming and it is from this firm foundation that their interest and capability are developed through both key stages. We are currently running an extremely popular and successful GCSE in computing in addition to core GCSE ICT.

Virtual Learning Environments provide learners of all ages with 24/7 access to media rich, engaging materials. We are a Flagship department in the pioneering use of these new technologies. We have embedded the use of Moodle (our VLE) in our own teaching practice and actively promote its use as a teaching and learning tool across the school and support VLE development County wide.


Each year students are able to visit local colleges, attend University seminars and employer workshops. Through the cadet force students are able to find out more about the armed services.

All staff believe that our school should provide a safe, caring, positive and stimulating environment that promotes the social, physical and moral development of the individual child. The Governing Body takes its responsibility seriously to safeguard and promote the welfare of children and works together with staff and external agencies to ensure there are appropriate arrangements within our school to identify, assess and support those children who are at risk. We recognise that all staff and Governors have a full and active part to play in protecting our pupils and that the child's welfare is our paramount concern.

Student Welfare

The Student Welfare Team are an integral part of the excellent pastoral support offered in Penair School. There are two Student Welfare Officers attached to each Key Stage, supporting the Progress/Pastoral Leaders and Form Tutors.


The Student Welfare Officers deliver bespoke programmes of support for students as required, focusing on issues such as self-esteem, anxiety and emotional wellbeing. In addition they work closely with students and parents in promoting excellent attendance in order to ensure every student has the best possible outcomes in Year 11.

Pupils are known as individuals and are well cared for. There is a well developed and comprehensive network of support in place to support pupils when they need it. Parents, pupils and staff agree that pupils are kept safe. They appreciate the strong safeguarding culture in place to protect pupils. Staff take their responsibilities very seriously.





SEND

All students at Penair School are entitled to an inclusive education. Students that are identified as needing additional support with their learning are added to the school's Record of Need. This RoN informs staff of their students' barriers to learning and the provision they need to access our broad curriculum. Students' progress is monitored by the class teacher, Head of Faculty, Director of Learning and also by the school's Director of Inclusion. Students can be placed on (or taken off) the Record of Need at any stage of their school life but most have been identified by their primary school.

Penair School's Local offer outlines how we are committed to meeting the needs of students with Special Educational Needs and disabilities. Staff are committed to identifying and providing for the needs of ALL children. We are an inclusive school and believe that everyone should be encouraged to reach their full potential as a learner. To that end the Bywva Inclusion Centre provides additional support to students who may experience difficulties accessing the school timetable. The inclusion centre fosters a calm and caring environment with a commitment to meeting the social, emotional and intellectual needs of young people. Penair School's Director of Inclusion is Charlotte Valles who is responsible for the day-to-day provision for students with additional educational needs.

Penair School operate an Equal Opportunity policy for the admission of students with special educational needs and they are afforded the same rights as students without special educational needs. The school takes advice from the Local Authority and has a SEND policy to ensure that students with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities can access learning.

Combined Cadet Force (CCF)

We are proud to boast the only standalone Royal Air Force CCF unit in the country, and the only CCF unit of any service in Cornwall.

The CCF is sponsored by the Ministry of Defence with the aim of providing a disciplined organisation in a school so that pupils may develop powers of leadership by means of training to promote the qualities of responsibility, self-reliance, resourcefulness, endurance and perseverance." It is not a recruiting organisation but a significant proportion of officers in the armed forces have served in the CCF. As the CCF is sponsored by the MOD, we have access to the training facilities used by UK regular forces personnel.

We parade every Wednesday from 3:15 until 5:15. Typical activities include aviation focused lessons, leadership activities, drill (marching), First Aid training, .22 rifle shooting, mountain biking, climbing and map work. Cadets work through the CCF syllabus to gain qualifications and promotions. During the Easter and Summer holidays, we are allocated flying places and cadets gain airborne experience in the Grob Tutor. We aim to ensure that every cadet has a flight-some have had 6 flights so far during their time in the section.

Other activities we have enjoyed during the first 18 months of our existence include shooting the L98 rifle (the air cadet version of the regular armed forces weapon), mountain trips, annual camp to RAF Honington, overseas camp to Cyprus, successful completion of the Air Cadet Leadership Course, participation in the Remembrance parade, competing in the CCF (RAF) annual competition at RAF Blandford and termly overnight camps incorporating night exercises. This is an extensive list and illustrates the range of opportunities on offer to our cadets.

Our cadets are a welcoming group of pupils ranging from Year 8 to Year 12. By joining, pupils develop friendships that span year groups and school populations. The huge range of activities we undertake are designed to push each individual's boundaries, helping them to develop their confidence and leadership skills, as well as giving them new and exciting experiences. Our annual camp, which takes place during Curriculum Enrichment week, is the highlight of the year. As well as being a huge amount of fun, it effectively gives pupils work experience from year 8 upwards.







Their work is then collated and published in our annual creative book which is available to buy at WHSmith and Waterstones. We also run termly creative days for students to really get creative and work on ideas for the book. Students are given the opportunity to speak about their creations on CHBN radio.

The Creative Club gives students a chance to flex their creative muscles and to have their work published. Students have also used their own time during weekends to sell copies of the book to members of the public.



One of the enduring qualities that I remember from Penair, was the fierce sense of independence and leadership that the school fostered in us. I wanted to be a war photographer at 15. I'm often asked by people why I have chosen to pursue documentary photography; not least to get involved in the stories and issues that have been enveloping the Middle East for the past decade. Besides being head over heels for any sporting extra curricular activity that Penair could throw at me, it was while studying for my English and History GCSE, that opened my mind to the real stories of real people outside of the school gate.

Studying the complex narratives of American and Russian foreign policy at the end of the cold war, expertly and vividly told by Ms Brumby, opened my eyes to the journalists and visuals of the Vietnam war, which in turn led me to discover the work of Don Mcullin. Terrifying, poignant, and courageous work. Also, the studying of a novel, like Ms Donelley's chosen book for study on the last days of the Junta in Chille, from the viewpoint of an under ground political activist, now reminds me of a famous David Burnet image from the period of a young man being arrested, his face perplexed behind a crowd of militia with guns and metal hats.

I'm now lucky or unlucky enough to have photographed 3 revolutions, the birth of a new nation, an attempted coup and two wars. I've spent time with world leaders, been on the road with rock bands and lived in 4 countries and regularly work with Time magazine, the New York Times, The Sunday Times and National Geographic (I currently live in Istanbul).

I know that in the midst of some of these extreme situations I've dealt with people exactly the same way that I learned to deal with them at Penair; to treat everybody with respect and to listen to their stories; to be human and to do my absolute best to represent them fairly. In todays polarised and often complex world, I like to think it was where I am from and where I went to school that has shaped not only me but the photographs that I take.
